CHAT WITH DANNY MAWUENYEGA

It was a slightly overcast Wednesday morning when I got to meet with the Chairman of Accra Ridge Church Council. We met in his office on the Church premises. Though cosy, I was looking forward to a much bigger office space. After all, this church is about to turn 90 years old.


The Council Chair of the Accra Ridge Church is Danny Easmon Mawuenyega. He has been leading the Church Council since March 2025. He has been a member of the Church for over 40 years. He's married to his lovely wife, Barbara, and they have three children and two grandchildren.

Speaking of 90th anniversaries (no, Council Chair is NOT 90 years old); our wonderful church turns 90 years old next year, 2026. Council Chair gave me a bit of historical background about how those 90 years begun.

The Church was started in 1935, by a group of expatriate men here in Accra, who conceived of an inter-denominational worship space. These men were Anglicans, and originally of the Low Mass. Eventually Methodist and Presbyterian Ministers were invited to join the group.

The Church was physically located just down the road from our current location, in a wooden building opposite the UN's FAO office in Accra. The wooden building actually belonged to the PWD. When the Church grew and moved, it was to a place just down the road, where the current ARC Hall is located.

The 90th anniversary is slated for celebration next year, but the Church is making preparations to launch it in early December, 2025.



Why are we celebrating this anniversary anyway, I asked Council Chair? "It's a milestone age", he said. For a Church of such stature and a unique one at that, at 90 years of existence, Accra Ridge Church is certainly worthy of celebration. "We need to recognise the founders of the Church, thanking God for their vision, and how far He has brought us", Council Chairman added. Certainly, there are other joint churches, but we can be justifiably proud of having the Anglican, Methodist and Presbyterian denominations with Youth, and even Auxiliary members of the priesthood, pastoring us at the Ridge Church is a blessing to celebrate.

"An anniversary such as this should be an opportunity for us to glorify God, and evangelise the unsaved", he added.

In my chat with him, the Council Chair also said that he did not know any other church where there was such an involved laity like the Accra Ridge Church where we have so many lay preachers, lay readers, Bible Study leaders, etc. All of them were there voluntarily, to augment and support the clergy.

So, is there going to be a theme for the 90th anniversary celebration? According to the Council Chair, there have already been some proposals, and by God's grace a fitting theme will be revealed at the launch in December. Events for the anniversary are also under consideration, like outreach sessions, evangelism programmes, musical concerts, breakfast meetings, dinners, television and radio appearances, and fund-raising activities.

The Council Chair said he had asked for ceaseless daily prayers for the anniversary celebration, thanking God for how far he has brought us. In particular, it is his fervent prayer that all members will participate in all the events.

He intimated that nothing would make him happier than a full involvement from all Ridgeans, leading to a God-filled 90 more years.

For example, Ridge Church currently has branches at Tudu, Manet, and ACP Estates at Pokuase. Moving forward, the dream of the Church is to have more branches, even outside Accra.

Talking about the other engagements of the Church, the Chairman said with the ARC Hall mostly complete, and the car park showing newly

designated parking spaces, it is his hope that the Church would also embrace modernity. He spoke about other changes which will help the Church move forward, including de-coupling of the ARC Hall as a separate business, run by a CEO, for example. He explained that would enable the Church to further diversify its income generation and create a profitable aspect of the Church, saying, "We could commercialise more activities, and introduce some diversification, like rental of church space and grounds for events".

This would significantly augment our traditional sources of income, and ensure that the Church gains from these investments.

A CEO would have a business-oriented perspective, help to ensure a financially secure future for the Church, and accelerate evangelism and soul-winning.

This change would also guide us in improving certain aspects of the daily running of the Church and improve internal controls like audit, procurement, and spending.

With all these in place and functioning correctly, we may see our numbers grow. We will be able to invite more and more people to come and worship and fellowship with us.

Maybe they'll even realise that the Accra Ridge Church is not the 'elite' place of worship we have been portrayed as being!

As his final message, the Chairman of Council had this to say: "The 90th anniversary is a great opportunity to revamp, to regenerate, and to revive, our generation and the next".

He added, "Let's make an impact on society and win more souls for the Lord in the spirit of the love of Jesus".

Extending Arm Of Help:

HOW ACCRA RIDGE CHURCH IS SUPPORTING ITS OWN

Living so much by its belief in God's goodness and kindness and encouragement to do good and show love to others, the Accra Ridge Church(ARC) Council in 2018 took a decision to establish a Welfare policy to cater for the welfare needs of its members on a more structured basis.

At the Church's Annual General Meeting (AGM) of 2019 therefore, the new Council brought the proposed Welfare Policy of 2018 to the AGM for ratification.

Approved by the meeting, the policy which was brought into full force in September 2022 has since come to life effective 2023. The policy has been of help to some Church members who subsequently applied to be considered for assistance as per the policy's guidelines.

The nine-member Welfare Committee charged with the administration of the Policy is currently chaired by Lawyer Mrs. Lucy Felicity Arthur (LFA), a long time standing member of the Church. The Committee members have been drawn from some groups from all the branches of the Church - Accra Ridge Church, Manet, Tudu and ACP Estates, Pokuase.

The Welfare Policy is meant to cater for the less endowed and needy Church members. The Church provided the initial seed money of fifty thousand Cedis (GHS50, 000) to be invested for three years after which the scheme was to be operationalised.

Ridge Alive caught up with Mrs. Arthur to understand further what the Welfare Policy has done and how one could access it as a Church member in need of assistance.

Below, we reproduce the full interview:

RA: What is the objective of the ARC Welfare Policy?

LFA: To assist registered and paid up members in marriage, sickness, bereavement, payment of medical bills, accommodation and any needs that the Committee shall consider as meriting help.

RA: Who benefits :

LFA: Any registered and paid up member of the Church can apply. The application must be channelled through the Church administration, bearing in mind the eligibility of members from all the branches of the Church.

RA: Is this not a duplication of the welfare arrangements being operationalised by the various Groups?

LFA: This scheme is different from the welfare arrangements

by the various Church Groups. However, the Groups could refer cases to the Committee and those would be dealt with in accordance with the mandate given. Due diligence is necessary before funds are given out to the institution which gave the invoice to the applicant or in the case of rent, directly to the landlord.

RA: How different is the Welfare Policy from the Christian Education Policy of the Christian Services Group?

LFA: The Church's welfare scheme is different from that operated by the Christian Services, in that; we only make a one off payment to help educational expenses. If an applicant needs funding for an entire course, we refer such to the Christian Services which has the education assistance mandate.

RA: Who benefits and what are the criteria for selection of beneficiaries?

LFA: First, the Committee meticulously goes through all applications, especially, those for rent. We do a thorough background check before any decision is made. Every decision is based on merit. We cannot sustain indefinite payments for rents and so we make a one off contribution to assist with yearly rent.

We also make donations on behalf of the Church to families of bereaved members and also to spouses, children and parents.

Donations are also made to newly wedded couples. Information for these is provided by the Church's Administration.

There have also been medical and educational supports. Funds for these go directly to the appropriate institutions which provide the invoice.

RA: How sustainable is the Welfare Policy?

LFA: The policy is sustainable since the initial investment by the Church has yielded significant sum. So far, the supports being asked for are not huge so plans are in place for "special offertory" to be collected twice a year towards this worthy cause.

RA: Thank you so much for taking up the challenge to help the Church administer financial help to our own. We pray the fund will grow beyond expectation so that many more Church members would receive help at their times of need. May God richly bless you and the Committee members.

CONVERSATION WITH OUR OWN:

MRS. ELISE EVANS-ANFOM

FORMER CHAIRPERSON OF COUNCIL

W

e introduced to you, Mrs. Elise Evans-Anfom, a former Chairperson of the Accra Ridge Church Council.

In a chat with Ridge Alive, she recounted how pleased she was to have been interviewed for the Christmas edition of the magazine. She shared her family life, education, stays abroad and introduce us to her rich experiences at Accra Ridge Church where she served as the 22nd Chairperson of Council.

FAMILY

Mrs. Elise Evans-Anfom's mother, Memuna, was from Tamale in the Northern Region. She recalled how her father, Wilhelm Henkel, an educationist, loved to build schools, including the one she attended, the Henkel Memorial School in Kete-Krachi. He built another school also in Lawra.

Auntie Elise, as many people called her, had five siblings, three sisters and two brothers. Her sisters were Letitia, Susan and Juliana Henkel. Letitia got married to Kwame Kwarteng who worked for many years with the International Monetary Fund (IMF). Susan, who later became Mrs. Alhassan, was a Minister for Education in Dr. Kwame Nkrumah's government. She was later appointed Commissioner for Education in the early years of Flt. Lt. J.J. Rawlings's regime. Her third sister, Juliana, became Mrs. Asafo-Adjaye.

Her two brothers were Ludwig and Luther Henkel. She was very close to her brother Ludwig who became a medical doctor. In their younger days, Ludwig wanted her to train as a nurse so they would work together should he become a doctor in medicine. He became a doctor all right, and practised for some time in Ghana but was mostly in the UK. Her career path however went elsewhere so their childhood wish did not materialise.

EDUCATION

Auntie Elise attended Achimota School and was at Slessor House. She excelled at swimming, she said, and won many trophies for her House. She was also in the School Choir which she loved but due to some personal reasons she left the Choir. She loved singing and still does, recalling how recently at the Ridge Church when the Choir sang the Hallelujah Chorus, she lustily sang along with them, much to the admiration of the immediate past Chairperson of Council, Miss Abigail Armah.

She recalled that at Achimota, she did Additional Mathematics and Additional Science.

NEW PATHWAYS

She recounted how one day her sister Susan arrived with a form for her to complete. It was for a scholarship to go abroad to



study Home Science. She protested that she was a science student but her sister insisted she completed it and sign. She did. What made her give in was the hope of becoming a "been-to" that is someone who has been abroad and returned.

Unexpectedly, she won the scholarship, despite not being a Home Science student. She was the first to do so and also pass the interview which followed, and soon found herself in Aberdeen, Scotland, United Kingdom to study at the Robert Gordon's Technical College School of Domestic Science. Her hopes of becoming a much sought after professional been-to was now materialising.

RETURN HOME

Mrs. Elise Evans-Anfom returned home in 1957. Her first posting was to Fijai Secondary School in Sekondi where she taught Home Science. Later, she moved to Kumasi when she was appointed as Home Science Organiser for the Ashanti and Brong-Ahafo Regions.

Initially, she was not too comfortable with the position since she had to deal with much older people who sometimes came to her to solicit good reports for them to be posted to Accra. She was subsequently posted to the Winneba Specialist Training College though not for long.

SECOND TRIP ABROAD

Mrs. Elise Evans-Anfom was awarded another scholarship to the UK for a course in Science, again in Aberdeen.

As it turned out, her younger brother Luther was in Paris, France, just across the channel at the time, and invited her over. Once there, she soon found the need to learn French to cope. All her brother's friends were French speaking.

Later she was able to pursue a degree in French at the University level.

While in France she met a young man, a Nigerian called Francis Abiola Irele. They got married and came together to Ghana where she set up an interpretation and translation office called InterBuro. She also taught French at the School of Languages. That marriage did not last.

On her return from abroad, she fell sick with serious malaria which ended her on admission at the Tamale hospital where Dr. Emmanuel Evans-Anfom happened to be the doctor-in-charge. She recalled when he saw the name Henkel; he asked her if she was related to Susan Alhassan (her older sister). He later invited her home to meet his wife and family.

A number of years later, their paths crossed again while she was on her sick bed. His wife Leonora had sadly passed away by then. She later became the second Mrs. Evans-Anfom, gaining 4 step children, Nii Okai, Nii Teiko, Rachel and Charlie.

She took up volunteer teaching at the Ridge Church School. She used the direct method in teaching French to the class for Secondary School and they loved it. She gave them small parts to act out in French, which helped them to express themselves in the language without the written grammar. She said later they used to hail her in town with one French phrase or other, wherever they encountered her, calling out "French Teacher"! French Teacher!

ACCRA RIDGE CHURCH (ARC)

Her encounter with Accra Ridge Church was not by accident. When she finally returned home and settled, Mrs. Evans-Anfom found out that both her sisters Leticia and Susan were attending services at the Accra Ridge Church and so used to join them. She loved the fellowship she experienced, the friendliness of the members and how they did things together. She simply loved it; and so decided to make ARC her regular place of worship.

She loved Bible songs when she was in Kete-Krachi. She remembered a song from the Bible about Moses parting the Red Sea for the Israelites. She said songs like that had some effect on her as a child. It was later in her life that she realised she had felt the spirit of God at an early age.

CHURCH ACTIVITIES

Having formally become a member of ARC, Mrs. Evans-Anfom, joined some of the groups in the Church. These included Christian Education and Visitation Group (This entailed serving communion with the then pastor).

As a member of the Visitation Group, she recalled their visits to the Ridge Hospital, Accra, where they prayed by the bedsides of patients who could not get out of bed. She added that they were provided with space to pray with those who were well enough to leave their beds and



join in. The group also visited Church members who were sick at home and could not attend Church services and prayed for them.

OTHER CHURCH ROLES

She very much remembered being asked to preach to newly confirmed members and their parents and she felt inspired by the spirit of God who enabled her.

She also testified to the fact that she never felt tired doing God's work in the Church and added that what she liked most about the Accra Ridge Church and which made her join, was the "Fellowship" that existed then and even now and suggested that we held on firmly to it.

The former Council Chairperson's encouragement to the youth of the Church, as well as other members, is to live the life of Christ, not just to say it, but to make it a way of life, stressing that we practice it and help other people to live the Christian life.

CONCLUSION

Sharing her final words, Mrs. Elise Evans-Anfom had this to say: "I was pleased to have hosted one of the biggest Church Bible Study Fellowships in my house for a number of years".

ARC CLaN System & How You Fit In As A Member

Executive Summary

The CLaN (Church Life and Nurture) concept is a ministry framework with its origins rooted in the Presbyterian Church that focuses on deepening spiritual growth, Christian education, and holistic member engagement across all age groups.

The purpose and vision of the originators are as follows:

- To nurture the spiritual life of the church community, ensuring that members grow in faith, understanding, and active participation.
- To emphasize discipleship, education, and fellowship, aiming to build a vibrant, spiritually mature congregation.

Background

The 2018 AGM adopted the Discipleship Strategy (DS), which was premised on the desire to improve spiritual life at ARC.

The 2021 AGM adopted the Paradigm Shift (PS) document, which was premised on concerns about spiritual growth, as well as the governance structure at ARC.

This AGM charged the Church Council to review the PS document and present its findings at the next AGM.

At the 2022 AGM, Council presented its findings and proposed a revised governance structure, which includes the CLaN Ministries Framework, aimed at encouraging and enhancing the spiritual growth of members.

Through the Paradigm Shift Implementation Committee, pilot Ministry Committees were set up in 2023 and the SGM of 28th July, 2024 voted by a majority decision to approve the allocation of church groups into the 6 CLaN Ministries, empower the clergy to oversee the activities of the Ministries and for the appointment of coordinators for the various Ministries.

The ARC Module

Under the ARC CLaN Framework, all Church groups have been grouped under the following six Ministries: (1) Discipleship, (2) Worship and Music,

(3) Prayer, (4) Outreach, (5) Care and (6) Generational Groups.

Each Ministry is coordinated by a committee headed by a Minister, supported by a lay Coordinator.

All Groups continue to exist and run as currently pertains.

Ministry Committees, (rather than Council) will handle primary matters and decisions

The six CLaN Ministries will be overseen by the Clergy with the support of the six Ministry Coordinators, who will together form the Ministerial and Pastoral Oversight Board (or CLaN Board).

Ministry Mandates

Currently, all the 6 ministries have been formed and are functional; having meetings, taking decisions and reporting to Council on their activities, decisions, challenges, and concerns and making recommendations on matters within the scope of work. Below is a brief outline of the terms of reference for each ARC CLaN Ministry.

Discipleship Ministry

The Discipleship Ministry's mandate is to nurture and stimulate the spiritual lives of ARC members in attaining full maturity in their walk with Christ Jesus through the propagation of the Gospel and centered on Bible study and applying its teaching in daily life experiences.

Worship & Music Ministry

The focus of the Music and Worship Ministry is to ensure that all services at the ARC, are conducted in a conducive manner creating a proper worship experience for members of the congregation to worship in 'Spirit and in Truth'.

Prayer Ministry

The Prayer Ministry is responsible for encouraging, stimulating and deepening the spiritual lives of members through prayer by organizing consistent initiatives or activities including revivals and special prayer and fasting engagements to build a stronger, more prayerful ARC community.

Outreach Ministry

The Outreach Ministry's core mandate is to coordinate church activities aimed at those outside of the church community. They are to coordinate and ensure a holistic evangelization programme by engaging in works of love and service to the needy in our society.

Care Ministry

The practical demonstration of God's love is the focus of the Care Ministry. The ministry is to foster and nurture the spiritual, emotional, and physical well-being of members through various activities including visitation, counseling, support and social activations for all categories of members who may require such services. The principal goal is to ensure that everyone feels valued and uplifted in the love of Christ Jesus.

Generational Groups Ministry

The objective of the Generational Groups Ministry is to bring together all the gender and age defined groups within the church. By virtue of its composition, it encompasses the entire ARC congregation whether you belong to a well-defined group or not.

The CLaN Impact

Although the CLaN Ministries have been operational

for under a year, they have made steady progress and significant impact on the spiritual lives of the membership of ARC in the following areas:

- It has brought a sense of belonging and purpose within the church as more members get to be represented in decision making at the ministry level.
- It is slowly creating an Intergenerational mentorship and legacy-building atmosphere within the church groups
- It has created opportunities for members to serve, learn, and grow together.
- The ministries have made significant contributions and recommendations to the Church Council, some of which have necessitated change in policies.

The CLaN Board is however yet to be operationalized.

Conclusion

The CLaN ministries concept is a spiritual, tool for building up our lives as Christians and for sharing God's love as a church impacting community, workplaces, families and individual which is our core mandate as a church.

Memories of Christmas

AT ACCRA RIDGE CHURCH

December is already here which means that Christmas is just around the corner, bringing us once again the Message of Salvation.

And so I am now thinking about past Christmas activities here at Ridge Church and my mind immediately goes back to some of the Christmas Fêtes and Bazaars organised by the Women's Fellowship on behalf of the Church, over the years and in fact, decades ago.

I remember helping my Mother, in my younger days, with her stall on a few occasions. As soon as it was confirmed that the Christmas Fête would be held in December and she was given her assignment, she would go round to a particular factory she was very familiar with and friends who had small companies, asking for items for her stall and she would come back home with cartons of canned products, toiletries etc., which she had received as donations for the Event. Her stall consisted of made in Ghana goods. I would help her to group them and price the items ready for the big day. I remember she would also ask the family of a friend of hers to come and fry the much loved kelewele which was always heavily patronised by adults and children alike; everyone wanted some of the delicious kelewele.

There was horse riding for the children as well as a variety of games for both the young and old, Guess the Weight of the cake, ice-cream and drink stands, clothing and footwear stalls, lots of potted plants, and so much to buy for Christmas, such as Christmas cards, Christmas Cakes, Pastries, Sweets, etc. The Church and School grounds were always alive and bustling with activity, and an atmosphere

of great fun and true fellowship.

I also remember what happened to one of our Dear Ministers during a Bazaar. He was in charge of the stall for pineapples which had been donated specifically for sale at the Bazaar. He had had very brisk sales and was feeling very happy, one suddenly heard him shouting. When some of us rushed to find out what had happened we found out that a man who had pretended to be buying some of the pineapples had rather bolted off with all his proceeds. We tried to cheer him up by pointing out to him that there were still some pineapples to be sold and so his presence had not been in vain. That helped a bit. Activities then continued smoothly to the end. These Bazaars took a lot of organisation and commitment but the Women's Fellowship always pulled them off successfully.

Times have changed indeed and now there are so many different activities being organised everywhere that probably a Bazaar may not appear as attractive or enjoyable as it did many years ago. We can however look back and remember. We have had some very good and exciting times here at the Ridge Church over the years and we thank God for everything and for how far HE has brought us.

The Christmas message remains the same forever; the Birth of Our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Peace, goodwill toward men. Merry Christmas and GOD bless us all.

Embracing Wellness As A Carer

When she was 16 years old, my niece asked my mother a poignant question. **"Grandma, who cares for the Carer?"** This is a weighty topic in Wellness and I was impressed that her school had asked them to tackle it. Carers differ in the service they provide to the elderly, disabled and invalid, and whilst some follow this path as a profession, others embrace it as a service to an ailing relation/ loved one. Therefore, whilst the former category draw **pecuniary remuneration**, the latter are **rewarded in kind** or the appreciative look.

Whenever I went to massage my elderly aunt, I admired the efficient way in which my cousin and her daughter provided excellent care until she passed away aged 97. One would have thought that they had received training; however, it was **a labour of love**. Whereas the structure within some societies makes provision for support particularly for those who choose to do this voluntarily, my niece's question made me reflect on a topic which I daresay largely goes unaddressed in developing nations.

It is presumed that it is our responsibility – Christian duty – to care for our elderly relatives, disabled family members and those with chronic conditions which require either curative or palliative care. The family home, therefore, becomes a care home or hospice and those who can, hire staff to assist in the home whilst others take on the badge of the Carer and learn each day on the job.

There is no predefined age threshold for those who assume this role voluntarily. The spectrum for the acquisition of knowledge, challenges faced, support requirements, etc. is rather expansive. A young Careworker I know decided to train as a nurse because when she was barely a teenager, her maternal grandmother had a stroke and she learned to care for her. She was a good student but on occasion she struggled in school. It is starkly obvious when there are extremely limited or absolutely no systems in place to support this voluntary workforce who wish to make life comfortable for their loved one.

The Challenges

As the ages and experience of Carers vary, the challenges which they face might also differ. As this is an unpaid vocation, there may be financial issues, particularly if the carer has either a limited source of funding (e.g. a pension) or no regular income. For example, if a housewife is caring for her husband, their main source of income might be her savings, his pension, disability allowance, etc. Depending on the condition of the person being cared for, carework can be a **24-hour occupation**, (a job with no boundaries, time schedules, holidays, contractual obligations, end date, etc.), and the carer might become overwhelmed with chores and responsibilities. This exacerbates the chances of **fatigue, stress and anxiety** regardless of age, gender or experience.

Young carers may struggle with their education, develop behavioural issues and become withdrawn because of the vastness and complexity of their role. Carers may feel **anxious about the health and wellbeing of the person in their care especially** if health deteriorates and they are uncertain of what to expect. There can be a strong sentiment of loneliness and isolation if one does not have a supportive family, friends, neighbours, visitors from church groups, etc. In the event that their loved one passes away, the carer can become overwhelmed with **grief, guilt, regret**, etc.

Your Wellness

My aunt who was the principal carer for her invalid husband prioritised his health needs over hers. She sadly passed away before she could have surgery. A few weeks later, her husband also passed away. The carer's overall health and fitness are of tremendous importance and there are some practical steps which can be

taken to alleviate the impact of the challenges that a carer might face.

1. Financial Health: Research financial guidance options with a view to drawing up a long-term plan for financial stability and independence. A loan might be difficult to repay so another safe and stable means of augmenting one's savings or an income would be preferable. Pension or social security providers often have critical illness and disability schemes which could provide some respite.

2. Responsibilities: It is fine to ask reliable and willing friends, family and neighbours to assist if you feel overwhelmed. Hire a cleaner if you can afford it; reschedule non-urgent tasks and keep a diary/to-do list as a reminder.

3. Anxiety: When offering curative or palliative care it is natural to experience anxiety about the health and wellbeing of the person being cared for. Not knowing what the days ahead may present can be rather disconcerting, but you need to protect your mental health so, be mindful, be present and deal with the here and now.

4. Companionship: Loneliness can be overwhelming for a carer, so good communication and a listening ear are priceless. As money might be an issue, perhaps find a support group in your area, (or online as the case may now be), a friend or an objective person who can simply listen.

5. Health: Carers are inclined to neglect their personal health and needs, (good nutrition, physical activity and exercise, good personal hygiene, good sleep hygiene, etc.) To function efficiently, schedule regular check-ups with your doctor, dentist and optician. Exercise! Apart from being essential for your overall physical health, exercise releases endorphins which aid your mental health. Going to an exercise class once or twice a week would enable you to combine exercise, physical activity and socialising. Long walks can clear your head and fresh air, which is therapeutic, aids sleep.

6. Self Care: Spend quality time alone doing something you enjoy or socialising. A visit to the barbers or a little pampering. Wherever possible schedule regular days off when a family member, friend, trusted neighbour or respite carer could cover your time off. Take a reasonably-priced

vacation away from the location where care is given or consider a staycation if finances are stretched.

Wellbeing commences within and finds expression as we take calculated steps to achieve it. Access to various sites online makes it a little easier to practise your faith as a means of emotional, mental and spiritual wellness.

Explore interests such as music, reading, yoga, painting, pottery, etc. and aim to spend 30 minutes every day doing something that you love. I love exercising and reading so I make time every day as these practices help me to feel refreshed and less irritable. My day habitually begins with music, meditation or prayer while I drive and ends with reflection, music, etc. Some self-care options cost little and should not take you far from home if that is one of your concerns.

Communicate with the person under your care and document happy occasions with photos, videos, anecdotes, etc. because these are the things that you can both appreciate and treasure. There are experiences that you can also share such as playing relaxing sounds (wind chimes), music (calming water sounds), audio books, radio plays, audio recordings of poetry, scriptures, etc. These create a calming ambiance in the home for everyone.

There is help available so it is alright to embrace it when it is offered. When caring for another person you need to remind yourself that you are doing the best that one person can do. When you are relaxed, well-rested and happy, you create a serene and healthy environment for everyone.

Anniversary Launch Speech

Delivered on Sunday, 7th December 2023

Honored Clergy, Chairman & members of the Church Council, Generations of Ridgeans from Ridge, Manet, Tudu & ACP gathered here and online, invited guests and visitors, Brothers and Sisters in Christ: Praise the Lord! Today, we stand on the horizon of history. We stand at a vantage point where we can look back at nine decades of God's unwavering faithfulness and look forward into a future filled with His promise. It is with a heart full of gratitude and a spirit of expectation that I welcome you to the official launch of the 90th Anniversary Celebrations of the Accra Ridge Church.

Why do we celebrate ninety years? In the life of a human being, ninety is an age of frailty. But in the life of the Church, ninety is the age of strength, maturity, and established wisdom.

Ninety years ago, this institution began with a different demographic, in a different era of our nation's history. Yet, through the changing tides of colonial rule to independence, through political upheavals and social transformation, one thing has remained constant: The Lamp of God in this place has never gone out.



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MARRIAGE: BIBLICAL PERSPECTIVES

The teachings of Christ as contained in the Bible make room for adults who are of age and decide to get married. Therefore, when a man and woman come before God in a place of worship to be joined together, all they intend is inviting God into their union and trusting him through prayer to guide them in their marital journey.

The Unmarried

The Bible also permits Christians to remain unmarried but cautions them in 1 Corinthians 7:8-9(NIV) that if they cannot control themselves, they should marry, for it is better to marry than to burn with passion. It also alerts believers against sexual immorality in 1Corinthians 6:12(NIV) that "everything is permissible for me" ---but not everything is beneficial. "Everything is permissible for me" ---but I will not be mastered by anything. It is therefore obvious that God gives us liberty to make a choice with a tilt towards marriage.

Attraction and Courtship

It is important one gets to know whom he/she desires to marry. After the attraction stage, courtship sets in to enable the individuals study each other and make up their minds. This phase is very crucial as observations are made. Nonetheless, one may not see everything because people only reveal their good traits and suppress bad conduct.

For instance, a party to a union may be domineering by nature while another is liberal. However, with prayer, the Holy Spirit directs people into knowing what they want. It is advisable one is candid with the other in a frank manner when stating facts about him/herself and what is done for a living.

Love

By the Christian belief, marriage is sacred. It was instituted in the Garden of Eden when God observed during creation in Genesis 2:18(NIV) that "it is not good for the man to be alone. I will make him a helper suitable for him". Consequently, God created a woman out of the man's rib and brought her to the man. The man acknowledged the woman by saying "this is now bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh" Genesis 2:23(NIV). By accepting the woman, Adam simply admitted that the woman was part of him and confessed his feeling for her. Such an Adamic admission facilitates and activates the bonding process of love, and most men know and feel it when a woman is part of them. Accordingly, love is a fundamental and necessary requirement for a marital relationship to occur, and it must be sincere.

Marriage

In Christendom, marriage is governed by vows. It is between a man and a woman(1Corinthians7:2(NIV)). It is expected to last the lifetime of the parties as in 1 Corinthians 7:39(NIV) which specifically says a woman is bound to her husband as long as he lives. By Matthew 19: 5 – 6(NIV), the man is deemed to be united to his wife and the two will become one flesh in all they do.

Therefore, what God has joined together let no man separate. Scripture continues to say in 1 Corinthians 7:10-11 that a wife must not separate from her husband. But if she does, she must remain unmarried or else be reconciled to her husband; and a husband must not divorce his wife. The only ground permitted for divorce by biblical teaching is marital unfaithfulness (Matthew 19:9 NIV). Marriage is also considered as a forum for learning so parties to a union must be teachable, prepared to learn and opt for a positive outcome.

Motives For Marriage

In contemporary times, people marry for varied reasons. It is also influenced by numerous factors amongst which four are critical to the writer, namely, inherent manners, socialization, culture and extrinsic factors.

Apart from the reason God gave in the Garden of Eden as noted above, 1 Corinthians 7:3-5(NIV) says the husband should fulfil his marital duty to his wife and likewise the wife to her husband. The wife's body does not belong to her alone but also to her husband.

In the same way, the husband's body does not belong to him alone but also to his wife. Do not deprive each other except by mutual consent and for a time, so that you may devote yourselves to prayer. Then come together again so that Satan will not tempt you because of your lack of self-control.

"Side-Chicks" do not form part of the equation in a Christian marriage. In fact, Hebrews 13:4(NIV) tells us that marriage should be honoured by all, and the marriage bed kept pure for God will judge the adulterer and all the sexually immoral.

Responsibilities & Instructions

In Ghana, a Christian suitor and the relevant family members fulfill requirements set by the woman's family prior to entering a place of worship to accomplish the marriage.

As stated earlier, God created woman to serve as a helper to man so in a Christian marriage, the two are expected to co-operate and work together towards the success of the marriage bearing in mind that scripture behoves the woman to be submissive to the husband (1 Peter 3:1 NIV) while the man in Ephesians 5: 23(NIV) is seen as the head of the wife.....There is a bigger responsibility for husbands in Ephesians 5:25-32(NIV) to love their wives.

This love is compared to how Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her. It is emphasized in Ephesians 5: 28-29(NIV) that husbands ought to love their wives as their own bodies. He who loves his wife loves himself. After all, no one ever hated his own body, but he feeds and cares for it just as Christ does for the Church. According to Ephesians 5:33b(NIV) a wife must respect the husband and in Colossians 3:19(NIV) husbands are not to be harsh with their wives.

Scripture continues to say in 1 Peter 3:3-6(NIV) that a woman's beauty should not come from outward adornment... but beauty must manifest from within and should be that of an unfading beauty of a gentle and quiet spirit which is of great worth in God's sight. This was how the holy women of the past such as Sarah made themselves beautiful. Similarly, 1 Peter 3:7 (NIV) directs husbands to be considerate as they live with their wives and treat them with respect as the weaker partner and as heirs with you of the gracious gift of life, so that nothing will hinder your prayers.

Happiness and satisfaction


Aside the biblical verses for guidance cited above, I dare state that some man-made instructions and/recipes for Christian marriages have woefully failed and created problems for couples. A prescription that works for couple A may not work for couple B or C. Hence before one marries in the Church, it is necessary to understand God's word.

Humans are imperfect. They have their shortcomings but when they get attracted through love and become husband and wife, the Word of God sets a standard for them to which they must comply. They cannot meet this standard through their efforts but by prayer and reliance on God's word, they will survive the storms of marriage.

Couples guided by scripture mature in their relationships as the days and years go by. By the grace of God, they develop continual affection and fondness for each other. They must practice love as depicted in 1 Corinthians 13:4-8.

Prayer

It is very important to pray together as a couple and pray for one another as well. Commit everything about the marriage to God through Christ. Couples must have faith and believe that God answers prayer. They should simply trust him. If instant answers do not come, the couple should be patient and wait on the Lord for the Father knows what you need before you ask him (Matthew 6:8 NIV)



Understanding MARRIAGE & FAMILY LAW in Ghana

ACCRA RIDGE CHURCH MANET MENS FELLOWSHIP LEGAL SERIES REPORT

The Men's Fellowship of the Accra Ridge Church Manet Branch successfully launched its Legal Series with a highly engaging and enlightening session led by Mrs. Margaret Acheampong, an experienced lawyer and family law advocate. **The maiden topic, "Understanding Marriage and Family Law in Ghana," focused on an area that touches the lives of many families in the church and wider community.** Highlights of the Presentation Mrs. Acheampong delivered a clear and insightful exposition on the various types of marriages recognized under Ghanaian law, placing particular emphasis on customary marriage.

She explained the following key points:

1. Customary marriage is deeply rooted in family structures, and its validity depends heavily on the consent of four key family groups—not just the parents of the couple. She emphasized that without the full consent of these family lineages, a customary marriage may be considered incomplete or invalid.
2. She addressed the unique rights and limitations under customary law, including the fact that men are permitted to take additional wives under certain circumstances, notably with the consent of existing wives. Conversely, under customary marriage, a woman cannot marry another man unless the previous customary marriage is properly dissolved.
3. The audience appreciated her clarification on the common confusion between "engagements" and proper customary marriages. She noted that what modern Ghanaian society calls engagements often incorporates foreign traditions and are not necessarily synonymous with legally recognized customary marriages.
4. Mrs. Acheampong also challenged the widely held practice of performing customary ceremonies before ordinance marriages, stating that either type of marriage stands on its own as fully recognized under Ghanaian law. She argued that a couple may validly choose to go straight to an ordinance marriage or remain solely under customary marriage, without performing both.

Audience Engagement

The session was remarkably interactive. Participants posed numerous practical questions, ranging from:- the registration of customary marriages,- variations in how different families practice and interpret customary rites,- and the legal implications of modern relationship scenarios.

The discussion was so rich that, to the surprise of the organizers, the Q&A segment had to be ended earlier than anticipated due to time constraints.

Upcoming Sessions in the Legal Series Building on the strong foundation laid today, the Accra Ridge Church Manet Men's Fellowship will continue the Legal Series with two additional sessions:

1. Understanding Ordinance Marriage. Tentative Date: Second Sunday of December 2025. This session will explain the legal structure, requirements, rights, and obligations under ordinance marriage, helping couples and families understand the implications of entering a monogamous marriage regulated by statutory laws.

2. Dissolution of Marriage: What You Need to Know Tentative Date: Third Sunday of January 2026

This final session in the series will address the legal processes, responsibilities, and considerations involved in ending a marriage under Ghanaian law, as well as pastoral and family responsibilities during such transitions.

The session was a landmark moment for the Men's Fellowship as it fulfilled its vision of strengthening families through practical knowledge, mentorship, and intergenerational engagement. Mrs. Acheampong's presentation brought clarity, sparked thoughtful discussion, and left many participants looking forward to the next sessions.

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
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
